- Traveling on a cruise ship or river boat

State Food Assistance

Pennsylvania State officials have encouraged all Pennsylvania residents to take full advantage of all food assistance programs, if needed, over the holiday season.

"Pennsylvania's food assistance programs were built for times like these and no one should be too shy to take advantage of what they have to offer," said Russell Redding, secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.

But those assets haven't stopped the covid-19 pandemic from destabilizing personal finances and causing heightened food insecurity for millions of residents. Compared to 2018, when roughly 11% of adults in Pennsylvania were food insecure, Redding said 15.5% experience the issue this year.

The difference is even starker when it comes to children in the state. In 2018, 15% children experienced food insecurity. That number has climbed to 24% in 2020.

Local food pantries saw greater demand especially early in the pandemic and through the summer, with miles-long lines at each weekly distribution and millions of pounds of food provided.

"Food insecurity was a problem for millions of Americans before March 2020," said Teresa Miller, secretary of the Department of Human Services.

CDC Expands the Definition of 'Close Contact'

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released new guidelines on Wednesday regarding what counts as "close contact" with someone who has COVID-19.

The expanded definition includes brief but repeated exposure to others with the virus that adds up to 15 minutes over a 24-hour period. Previously, the CDC defined close contact as spending 15 consecutive minutes or more within six feet of someone with COVID-19.

This makes mask-wearing even more important for preventing transmission



St. Luke's Plan for Vaccinating Communities

St. Luke's has engaged in extensive preparations to expand COVID-19 vaccination access to the general population in a smooth, orderly and safe fashion.

St. Luke's thus far has concentrated its vaccination efforts on Phase 1a priority groups As they prepare for the state to move into the next phase as announced today, St. Luke's has developed a process to allow individuals to sign-up for notifications regarding the vaccine.

"We are proceeding in a thoughtful, orderly and safe way," says Jeffrey Jahre, MD, St. Luke's Senior VPMA regarding the Department of Health's announcement today. "As per the state, we are opening scheduling to individuals age 65+ and those with medical conditions. To avoid lines and chaos, we are prioritizing individuals at the highest risk starting with individuals 75+ and rapidly working down the list as we have supplies.

We anticipate that with increased supplies in manufacturing and the addition of other vaccines, like Johnson & Johnson's, that there will be rapid increase in our ability to accommodate the entire population."

As of today, anyone can pre-register for vaccination through the St. Luke's MyChart portal at www.sluhn. org/vaccine. Those who do not have a MyChart account may create one.

Alternatively, individuals who are currently eligible to receive the vaccine (health care providers, nursing home staff and first responders) may call, 1-866-STLUKES (785-8537), option 7.

After completing a brief questionnaire, MyChart users will be notified when it is their turn to schedule an appointment for the vaccine, which they will be able to do online.

If accessing MyChart via the St. Luke's mobile app, users can find the COVID-19 Vaccine pre-registration under "Questionnaires à Optional Questionnaires."

Cornonavirus Variant May Spread 70% Faster


Just as vaccines begin to offer hope for a path out of the pandemic, officials in Britain this past weekend sounded an urgent alarm about what they called a highly contagious new variant of the coronavirus circulating in England.

Citing the rapid spread of the virus through London and surrounding areas, Prime Minister Boris Johnson imposed the country's most stringent lockdown since March.

But the estimate of greater transmissibility — British officials said the variant was as much as 70 percent more transmissible — is based on modeling and has not been confirmed in lab experiments, Dr. Cevik added.

Several experts urged caution, saying it would take years — not months — for the virus to evolve enough to render the current vaccines impotent.

"No one should worry that there is going to be a



single catastrophic mutation that suddenly renders all immunity and antibodies useless," Dr. Bloom said.

"It is going to be a process that occurs over the time scale of multiple years and requires the accumulation of multiple viral mutations," he added. "It's not going to be like an on-off switch."

The scientific nuance mattered little to Britain's neighbors. Worried by the potential influx of travelers carrying the variant, the Netherlands said it would suspend flights from Britain from Sunday until Jan. 1.

Tips to avoid getting and spreading COVID-19 In public:

Emails or online advertisements regarding a vaccine waiting list or offers to get vaccine doses shipped directly to your homeYou cannot pay money to put your name on a list to get the vaccine or get early access to the vaccine. Beware of generic greetings, grammar and spelling mistakes, or suspicious links and attachments in email messages

Phone calls or emails from a "vaccine distribution site" or "health care provider/insurance company" asking for your personal information.

In these instances, do not provide your social security number, credit card, or bank information

Social media posts with disinformation about the vaccine's origins and efficacy. Many times these may be accompanied with links to malware-laden websites or sites selling worthless and/or harmful products.

How to Talk About Terrorism With Kids

Watching an angry mob storm the Capitol building in response to Trump losing a second term was incredibly disturbing.

While the destruction was hard enough to witness as an adult, many parents worry about how their kids will process such a dark event in US history. As an act of domestic terrorism that was incited by a sitting President, speaking with children about what happened is important.

Although parents might be hesitant to bring up the insurrection with young children, preschool-aged kids can digest a basic understanding of what happened, particularly if they saw images or video footage on TV.

How Do You Explain What Transpired at the Capitol Building to Kids?

Before diving into a serious conversation about the attack on the Capitol, Reena B. Patel, a parenting expert and educational psychologist, urges parents to create a safe space for kids of all ages by allowing them to ask questions and not forcing them to talk about the topic until they're ready.

She also emphasized the importance of listening to get kids' perspectives and using the word "sometimes" when talking about the event to remind children that not everyone acts in this manner.

What's the Best Way to Teach Kids About Patriotism? "The best way is to discuss what patriotism is not. It is not using hate to make your opinion heard, harming others, or bullying others to change their views,"

Slate Belt Rising, a program of Community Action Committee of the Lehigh Valley (CACLV), is introducing a Commercial Lease Subsidy Program to attract new and expanding businesses to the Boroughs of Bangor, Pen Argyl, Portland, and Wind Gap.

This program will provide businesses the support they need to get off the ground, helping to build more vibrant downtown areas that attract more businesses and the talent needed to build a competitive economy, thus creating a stronger and more resilient community.

"This will serve as an incentive for new businesses to open or other businesses to expand in the Boroughs of Bangor, Pen Argyl, Portland, and Wind Gap," said Stephen Reider, Director of Slate Belt Rising. "Our goals are to lower commercial vacancy rates, provide economic opportunity and create more vibrant business districts that are welcoming for residents and visitors alike."

The program will provide financial support to a minimum of five businesses during their first six months of operation. Selected businesses will receive 100% of rent payments (up to \$1,500 monthly) for their first three months and 50% of rent payments (up to \$750 monthly) for their next three months. The lease payments will be made for six consecutive months.

Slate Belt Rising anticipates that this will advance the economic viability of the Slate Belt through business development, job creation, and promotion of Slate Belt small businesses within and outside the community.

Any new business opening or moving into one of the boroughs or an existing business looking to open a second location within one of the boroughs may be eligible for the program. Applicants must be planning to lease between 500-5,000 square feet of first floor, market-rate office or retail space for a minimum 2-year term.

Vaccine's Period of **Protection Uncertain**

Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Dr Anthony Fauci said that at this stage there is not enough data to determine how long the protection offered by the Moderna or the Pfizer/BioNTech COVID-19 vaccines will last.

CEO of BioNTech Uğur Şahin also said he is optimistic the immunization effect of the vaccine would last for a year, but they won't know for sure until July 2021 because the data available at this time only dates back to July 2020, when they started their trial.

What you need to know

- There isn't enough data at this time to determine how long each vaccine will protect people

- BioNTech's CEO said trial patients need to be monitored for a full year to measure the long-term effectiveness of the vaccine

- The efficacy rate of vaccines is a measurement of how effective they are under ideal circumstances

- Although the vaccines protect people from COVID-19, experts don't yet know if it will prevent someone spreading the virus, so other precautions, such as masks, will still be important

Home Heating Assistance

LIHEAP is a federally funded program that helps individuals and families pay their heating bills through home heating energy assistance grants. Can You Get Flu & COVID Vaccines Simultaneously?

No. according to the CDC. You should not get a COVID-19 vaccine and a flu vaccine at the same time. COVID-19 vaccines should be given alone with at least 14 days either before or after you get any other vaccines, including a flu vaccine. This is because there is currently limited information on the safety and effectiveness of getting other vaccines at the same

Fact COVID-19 vaccines will not give you COVID-19

None of the COVID-19 vaccines currently in development or in use in the United States, contain the live virus that causes COVID-19. There are several different types of vaccines in development. However, the goal for each of them is to teach our immune systems how to recognize and fight the virus that causes COVID-19. Sometimes this process can cause symptoms, such as fever. These symptoms are normal and are a sign that the body is building immunity. Learn more about how COVID-19 vaccines work.

It typically takes a few weeks for the body to build

immunity after vaccination. That means it's possible a person could be infected with the virus that causes COVID-19 just before or just after vaccination and

Neither the recently authorized and recommended vaccines nor the other COVID-19 vaccines currently in clinical

positive on viral tests, which are used to see if you have a current infection.

How Vaccine Recipients Felt After COVID-19

Lehigh Valley, Pa. (Dec. 22, 2020) - Wondering how it feels the day after a COVID-19 vaccine? Since Thursday, Lehigh Valley Health Network has administered more than 1,000 vaccinations to frontline, high-risk workers and plans to vaccinate about 6,000 more in the coming days.

Of those who received a vaccination, only three people reported side effects – one person had redness and swelling at the injection site, one had an itchy throat and the other had a fever. Symptoms for each person subsided quickly. Of the colleagues who had known severe allergies, no side effects were reported.

"Except for a sore arm at the injection site, much like how I felt when I got the flu shot, it is business as usual today," said Jennifer Rovella, DO, LVPG Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine. "I feel great knowing that this is the beginning to the end of the pandemic."

Chantal Branco, RN, LVHN Patient Care Services, the first person in the region and at LVHN to receive the Pfizer authorized vaccine had a similar reaction. "I'm feeling great today. My left arm is a little sore but nothing that is keeping me from my normal daily activities."

Glenn Thompson, RN, LVHN Emergency Services, said that getting the shot didn't limit him in any way. "About 24 hours after getting the vaccine, I have no issues besides a slightly sore arm at the injection site." Marcelo Gareca, MD, LVPG Infectious Diseases, even went a bit further in describing that he was not impacted by the vaccine.

"I am feeling fine. My arm is no sorer than when I get the flu shot. It did not stop me from doing yoga at home last night, working yesterday and today, or shoveling snow this morning."

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration says that the most commonly reported side effects are pain at the injection site, tiredness, headache, muscle pain, chills, joint pain and fever. It's important to remember that even if you do experience some of these mild symptoms, they usually go away within a day or two and the symptoms are far milder than what most people experience when they are sick with COVID-19. Medical officials say the vaccine cannot cause a COVID-19 infection.

While the shot itself cannot make you contagious, it is important for everyone to continue wearing a face mask. Officials say it is unclear at this point if the vaccine prevents people from becoming infected with COVID-19 or if it prevents feeling sick when infected. That means you could still transmit virus after you've received your shot.



Grants Save Money and Reduce Pollution

Harrisburg, PA – Grant funding for energy efficiency and pollution prevention projects for small business

owners and farmers is still available from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) through the Small



Business Advantage Grant program.

"This grant program was created with small businesses and farmers in mind. There are tremendous monetary savings available to Pennsylvania's small business owners by installing energy-efficient equipment, such as boilers, LED lighting, and Energy Star certified heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems," said DEP Secretary Patrick McDonnell. "Pennsylvania farmers can also benefit by using these funds to undertake projects which will divert sediment and nutrient runoff from our waterways."

Pennsylvania farmers and other small business owners with 100 or fewer full-time employees are eligible for the grants. Projects must save the business a minimum of \$500 and 25 percent annually in energy consumption or pollution related expenses. Natural resource protection projects are exempt from the minimums; however, the projects must be able to quantify sediment and nutrient reductions into nearby waterways.

Businesses can apply for 50 percent matching funds for equipment or materials, up to \$7,000, when adopting energy-efficient or pollution prevention equipment or processes. Applications are considered on a first come, first served basis, and will be accepted until fiscal year 2020-21 funds are exhausted, or Monday, April 12, 2021, whichever occurs first.

As part of the CCRSA, Congress and the current administration appropriated \$54.3 billion for the ESSER Fund. Funding is distributed to states based on each state's proportionate share of Title I, Part A (Title I-A) funding. Funds are intended to support COVID-19 response efforts and spent on a wide range of allowable activities.
